Teaching Abroad

In May and June 2014, Tim Bressmann was invited to spend time at the Department of Communication Sciences and Disorders at Ramathibodi Hospital in Bangkok, Thailand. Ramathibodi is the academic hospital of Mahidol University. The Department of Communication Sciences and Disorders is the only training program for Speech-Language Pathology in Thailand. It is housed in brand new facilities and is very well-equipped. Over the course of four weeks, Tim taught a class on voice disorders, cleft palate, and head and neck cancer to a group of graduate students. The time of the visit coincided with a military coup and the declaration of martial law in Thailand. While there were inconveniences such as a curfew and roadblocks, the coup took place in a fairly orderly manner, and the normal operations of the hospital were not affected. Tim spent a lot of time teaching and then preparing more lectures, but his hosts also took him on numerous outings to interesting and beautiful places around Bangkok. Tim particularly enjoyed the varied, delectable Thai cuisine and developed an appreciation for the durian fruit.



2014 SLP Alumni Association Distinguished Service Award Winner

Dr. Judy Seligman-Wine (left) is a speech language pathologist who was a pioneer in the development of the field of AAC internationally. She was on the team in Toronto that first used Blissymbols as a tool for communication with children with cerebral palsy, before moving to Israel. She was a founding member of ISAAC – the International Society for Augmentative and Alternative Communication, and served in a leadership capacity in that organization for many years. She founded the Israeli chapter of ISAAC – ISAAC-ISRAEL – and served as its chairperson for 14 years. She has taught courses on AAC in several of the Communications Disorders departments in Israel and has also taught abroad, including courses in Prague, Budapest and India. From 1996 until 2012 she served as a faculty member in the School for Augmentative and Alternative Communication at the Benedetta D’Intino Foundation in Milan, Italy. Over the years, she has worked in the development and implementation of AAC systems for many different populations of children and adults. In the past twelve years, she has specialized in providing communication tools to children with both Rett and Angelman syndrome.

Research Corner

Voice and Resonance Lab

Tim Bressmann, PhD, Faculty (Tenured)

We are interested in speech disorders related to craniofacial syndromes (e.g., cleft palate) and head & neck cancer. Some of our current research focuses on the assessment of tongue movement with ultrasound and the acoustic analysis of oral-nasal balance in speech.

Childhood Hearing Loss Lab

Alice Eriks-Brophy, PhD, Faculty (Tenured)

We are currently investigating the role of culture in parent-child communicative interactions for children with hearing loss using the LENA system. We are also examining cultural bias in assessment, intervention, and language outcomes for Canadian Aboriginal children.

Speech Fluency Lab

Luc De Nil, PhD, Faculty (Tenured)

We are exploring brain processes that lead to the development of stuttering in children and adults. By looking at functions and anatomy using state-of-the-art brain imaging, we can understand what factors cause stuttering and, importantly, what we can do better in treatment. In a recent study (Beal, et al. 2013 published in Cortex) we found that there are significant differences in brain anatomy between children who do and do not stutter.

Child Language Lab

Luigi Girolametto, PhD, Faculty (Tenured)

We are exploring second language learning patterns in sequential bilingual children who speak Cantonese in the home. Our aim is to determine typical error patterns in learning English to improve SLP assessments of Cantonese-speaking children with language disorders.

Language and Cognitive Development Lab

Elina Mainella Arnold, PhD, Faculty (Tenure Track)

We are investigating nonverbal cognitive mechanisms involved in language development. We are looking at the links between memory, attention, motor coordination and reasoning in children with typical and impaired language development.

Swallowing Lab

Rosemary Martino, PhD, Faculty (Tenured)

Our current research focuses on swallowing problems (dysphagia) in patients with head and neck cancer, stroke and other neurological diseases such as Parkinson's disease. We are studying how swallowing problem and its medical consequences can be identified earlier and more accurately. The ultimate goal of our research is to enhance disease recovery and reduce patient burden.

Language Sciences Lab

Elizabeth Rochon, PhD, Faculty (Tenured)

We are identifying the nature and components of linguistic and cognitive impairments subsequent to brain damage. We are developing new treatment approaches for language impairments in aphasia.

Oral Dynamics Lab

Pascal van Lieshout, PhD, Faculty (Tenured)

We are conducting research on oral motor control processes in speech production using state-of-the art technology. Our aim is to provide a better understanding of underlying physiological and physical control mechanisms based on dynamical system theory principles in healthy and speech-disordered populations across the lifespan.

Speech Production Lab

Yana Yunosova, PhD, Faculty (Tenured)

We are developing an instrumental protocol for the assessment of speech changes in Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis (ALS) and a process to automatically predict who will develop a bulbar form of ALS as disease progresses. We are developing a novel game-based therapy to improve articulation in patients with Parkinson disease.

Boaz Ben-David, PhD, Assistant Professor

(status-appointed)

We are currently using eye-tracker to assess online processing of speech perception in noise with older adults. We are identifying, sensory and cognitive sources for age-related differences in rating of emotions in spoken language.

Meltzer Lab

Jed Meltzer, PhD, Assistant Professor

(cross-appointed) Dept of Psychology

We are neuroimaging language through the use of fMRI, MEG, and EEG. We are evaluating dementia through computational linguistics. We are measuring neurostimulation in stroke and dementia, with TMS and TDCS.

We are investigating the pathophysiology of swallowing impairment and determine effective treatments to restore swallowing function. We are examining the mechanisms by which texture-modified foods and thickened liquids may lead to improved swallowing function in people with dysphagia.
